### 4a. Human Traces webinar series: Tackling the evolution and dynamics of the Anthropocene from sedimentary records in artificial lakes of Central Argentina: The water quality challenge

The Human Traces working group focuses on the long legacy of pre-Anthropocene human impacts. How do they manifest themselves in different parts of the world, and in different stratigraphic records? Human Traces aims to address the knowledge gap about spatial and temporal variations in early human impacts, with the overarching goal to create a global synthesis of human traces in geologic archives.

The Human Traces working group invites interested parties to attend a monthly Webinar Series. The next webinar is on the **22 February at 1500 UTC**, and will feature Dr Antony Brown (The Arctic University of Norway, Tromsø University Museum) on the topic "From Lakes to Soils: Using SedaDNA to Track the Human Past". #### 4b. 10<sup>th</sup> PMIP WINGS seminar

The Paleoclimate Modelling Intercomparison Project (PMIP) has launched PMIP WINGS (PMIP Web-based INteractive Global Seminars), an online seminar series which the group hopes everyone will want to be part of.

The next PMIP WINGS seminar will feature 20-minute stalks from Dr Gabriel Pontes and Dr Yasuto Watanabe, followed by a 10 minute Q&A for each (one hour in total). It will be chaired by Masakazu Yoshimori. Dr Pontes (Climate Change Research Centre and the Australian Centre for Excellence in Antarctic Sciences at the University of New South Wales) will present a talk on "ENSO sensitivity to background states: lessons from a multi-climate analysis". Dr Watanabe (Meteorological Research Institute of Japan Meteorological Agency) will present a talk on "Drivers of the 41-kyr glacial cycles during the early Pleistocene".

### 4c. Tipping Points Discussion Series: Sea Ice

This series of online discussions convened by AIMES, Future Earth, Earth Commission and WCRP aims to advance the knowledge about tipping points, irreversibility, and abrupt changes in the Earth system.

It supports efforts to increase consistency in treatment of tipping points in the scientific community, develop a research agenda, and design joint experiments and ideas for a Tipping Point Modelling Intercomparison Project (TIPMIP).

60-90 min events are held monthly and feature presentations from scientists working on the frontiers of earth systems research. You can register for each event individually to receive joining instructions. After an event, you can access recordings and materials by following links at the <u>event page</u>.

The next event will be held **22 February at 1500 UTC**, and will feature talks from Dirk Notz (University of Hamburg) and Marilyn Raphael (University of California), before a discussion moderated by François Massonnet (UC Louvain). # 7. PAGES Mobility Fellowships for African and Latin American and Caribbean ECRs

## 8. European School on Ostracoda - There are still a few places available! The European School on Ostracoda (EOS) will take place at the Patras University in Greece on 18 to 22 March 2024.

The course is designed to provide an overview of the *taxonomy, (palaeo)ecology, biodiversity, geological history* and *applied biostratigraphy* of ostracods. It is intended for young scientists and industrial staff interested in *micropalaeontology, palaeoceanography, palaeoclimatology, biology* and *environmental applications*. The focus will be on methods and concepts of ostracodology including systematics, biostratigraphic applications, ecology and life history spanning their fossil record from the Paleozoic to the Holocene and covering the recent fauna as well. Case studies from marine and continental systems as well as practical training for identification, preparation, documentation and analysis will be an important part of the course.
